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Somerset farmers in Robert Wiseman plant blockade

Supporters pledge to continue their action with Farmers for Action calling it a "necessity"

Up to 400 farmers have taken part in a second blockade at the Robert Wiseman milk processing plant in Somerset.

The farmers are protesting at supermarket prices which they say are driving them out of business.

James Badman, from Farmers for Action, said: "Such is the strength of feeling they're even turning out after a long day of haymaking and silage making."

Robert Wiseman said it had contingency measures in place to deal with disruption at its centres.

'Completely powerless'

A company spokesman said: "We have long standing contingency plans in place and a network of dairies across which we can process milk to meet the requirements of consumers.

"We fully understand the strength of feeling amongst dairy producers but we are not in a position to fund a milk price at the level it was prior to the global collapse in the value of cream.

"It is our hope that the market for cream which is at the core of this issue will quickly find a balance which will allow us to return improved prices to farmers."

Mr Badman said: "There are some supermarkets paying a sustainable price, albeit only the cost of production, but there does have to be a major shift in the power of the supply chain, because we are left completely powerless.

"It's going to go on until we get what we need because it's not greed that's driving this, it's necessity - we're going to be five pence below the cost of production."

On Thursday evening, more than 200 farmers in Somerset blockaded the Robert Wiseman plant.

A smaller blockade involving 30 tractors also took place on Thursday evening at the Morrisons distribution centre near Bridgwater.

Dairy farmers blockaded two supermarket distribution centres in a further night of protests over milk prices.

Farmers targeted the Morrisons distribution centres at Wakefield, West Yorkshire; and Gadbrook Park, Northwich, Cheshire.

Articulated lorries were forced to queue in the road as tractors blocked the entrance, preventing vehicles from entering and leaving the depots.

The protests follow similar demonstrations over the past week by members of Farmers For Action at supermarket distribution centres in the Midlands.

Protests centred on the Co-operative supermarket, with protestors targeting the retailer's distribution centre at Alfreton, Derbyshire.

Farmers continue to warn that farmgate milk prices must rise to meet increases in input costs. Many are losing 4p/litre or more on every litre produced.

The dairy co-operative First Milk has conceded that price cuts are a possibility. It has blamed downward price pressure on retailers, accusing them of refusing to pay more for cheese.

After the Alfreton protest, it emerged that the Co-operative had already increased the amount it paid First Milk for cheese production.

Protestors have now turned their attention to Morrisons, with is also a First Milk customer.

First Milk has said discussions with its retail customers are continuing in a bid to stave off the prospect of price cuts for producers supplying milk under its cheese contract.

These farmers are bracing themselves for a cut of up to 2p/litre from June unless the talks are successful in increasing higher cheese prices.

If they fail, the fear is that other milk buyers will also cut farmgate milk prices.

The protests raise the prospect of another summer of discontent following last year's SOS Dairy protests, which saw thousands of farmers take to the streets.

Farmers For Action chairman David Handley has accused dairy processors of "cherrypicking" from a voluntary code of practice designed to ensure fair farmgate milk prices.

Mr Handley is due to address a crisis meeting due to be held at Holsworthy Memorial Hall, Devon, this Wednesday (24 April).

Hundreds of farmers are expected to attend the meeting – many of them travelling to the venue in a convoy of tractors and farm vehicles.

More than 50 tractors are blocking two entrances to the Morrisons distribution centre near Bridgwater in Somerset.

Dairy farmers are protesting over a drop in the price they get for milk.

Several Morrisons vehicles are stuck at the depot and Farmers for Action said protesters would stay until someone from the company talks to them.

Avon and Somerset Police said the protest was affecting the A38 into Bridgwater and junction 23 of the M5, and diversions were in place.

Hundreds of farmers blockaded the Muller Wiseman plant in Market Drayton, Shropshire on Monday.

With fresh price cuts announced this week, the amount farmers receive for their milk has been slashed each month for the last four months.

Some farmers now say they face revenue losses of up to 25%.

The National Farmers Union (NFU) has urged supermarkets to pay more for milk.

Protestors target Morrisons over milk prices

Dairy farmers have targeted supermarket giant Morrisons in the latest protest against low milk prices.

Milk producers blockaded the retailer's distribution centre at Gadbrook Park, Cheshire, on Thursday (30 October).

The distribution centre on the outskirts of Northwich is understood to cover 850,000ft and is said to be Morrison's third largest depot.

Lorries were brought to a standstill for more than four hours as tractors and other farm vehicles were parked outside the depot gates.

Farmers have accused Morrisons of devaluing milk and undermining the dairy sector, with many farmers losing money on every litre produced.

They have also accused the retailer of putting pressure on processors by re-tendering its liquid milk deal. Morrisons current five-year contract is due to end in 2015.

The supermarket chain has responded by expressing "real sympathy" for farmers it says are suffering from "unparalleled movements" in global dairy commodity prices.

Morrisons says it plans to unveil a **new-style liquid milk contract aimed at helping farmers cope with sharp ups and downs in prices**.

A mechanism to address market fluctuations is said to be "well-advanced" – possibly a new contract to pay farmers a price transparently linked to movements in dairy commodities.

But milk producers remain unbowed, with protests expected to be stepped up over the coming weeks as the autumn maize harvest is completed.

Likely targets include the Co-op and Iceland – the latter which has been selling four pints of milk for as little in 89p in a bid to win customers from its rivals.

Some farmers have clocked up more than 1,500 miles in the past month to join their fellow milk producers at protests from Hampshire to Staffordshire, Somerset and Derbyshire.

Pressure group and protest co-ordinators Farmers For Action says retailers must realise that British milk producers deserve and must earn a sustainable milk price.

But the NFU says blockades are not the answer.

NFU dairy board chairman Rob Harrison said: "Blockading dairies is not a sensible option when, for me, it is not clear how or if it will actually deliver more money for farmers.

"We need to look at what changes are necessary in the industry for farmers to achieve fair and sustainable milk prices, and that is a long-term exercise."

Dairy farmers blockaded two Morrisons distribution centres as they stepped up their fight against milk price cuts.

Up to 200 farmers used about a dozen tractors to prevent lorries from accessing the Morrisons' depot in Middlewich, Cheshire.

Protest organisers Farmers For Action (FFA) said the blockades on Thursday (20 November) prevented lorries from getting in and out of the site.

By around midnight dozens of the retailer's lorries were seen parked up on roads from Gadbrook, up to one mile from the depot. The protest ended at around 2am.

Meanwhile, a second demonstration at the Morrisons distribution centre in Bridgwater, Somerset, caused similar disruption to the milk delivery services.

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Supermarkets targeted in night of farmer-led protests

Proud to Farm group takes supply chain fairness fight to Tesco, Morrisons, Asda and Sainsbury's




Image: Asda distribution centre in Chepstow was just one of the locations targeted by farmers

Farmers around the country staged blockades at several supermarkets in a protest over unfair pricing in the supply chain.

Members of Proud to Farm said they had been forced to take direct action and took to social media to appeal for farmers, producers and members of the public to join them at more than 30 supermarket distribution sites at 7pm last Friday (October 13).

The group had launched a campaign via TikTok which revealed the location of more than 30 distribution centres belonging to Asda, Sainsbury's, Morrisons and Tesco which were due to be targeted.


Tractors made their way to various locations with farmers nationwide pledging their support.

In Wales, FUW members joined protests outside Asda's distribution centre in Chepstow. The two-hour action saw around 15 lorries prevented from leaving.

One member told Farmers Guardian: "It was relatively small but it was effective. The aim was to let supermarket managers know that farmers are not happy with the current environment. Prices and contracts are just not sustainable.

"It was very peaceful and the lorry drivers were very supportive of our message."

Hampshire-based pig farmer Flavian Obiero pledged his backing saying he would be joining the protest to 'support the industry I love'.



Farm worker and Proud to Farm group member Becky Dack from North Yorkshire said the aim of the action was not to cause disruption or to upset to anyone but to let people know how farmers are being treated.

"We just want to be heard," she said. "We have been ignored for years and we need [supermarkets] to know that we can be seen.

"Farmers just want a fair price. We want the public to understand that if they buy local, then they are supporting local farmers. We understand some food has to be imported and that people want to shop at supermarkets but if you can buy British you may as well buy British.

"It is about fairness. Supermarkets are announcing record profits while many people who produce the food are living below the poverty line. It is wrong."

Ms Dack who has more than 35,000 followers on TikTok said it is not about making consumers to pay more but asking retailers to distribute the profits more fairly.

Fellow supporter and Lancashire-based farmer Eden Muzzall has also publicised the campaign, explaining to followers how farmers are impacted by current supply chains rules and encouraging members of the public to get behind the protest.


